



Bookings are selling fast for our Extravaganza Club changeover, please make sure you book and pay by this Sunday 11/6.


Andy & Allen—visitors from UK

International Exchange Student — Laurens

Since my last official meeting a month ago 2/5, I have had many experiences like cooking at the Salvation Army and participating in Interact meetings at the School. We had some fun days at School.

On the 19th of May I went to Port Adelaide to get onto the One and All sailing ship departing to Melbourne for the Rotary International Convention.

On board the ship we were split into 3 groups of eight students to work together to perform essential jobs on the sailing ship.

We sailed towards Kangaroo Island where we went for a swim and saw some Whales.

Day 3 we were sailing in the open ocean and quite a few of us were sea sick including several of the senior crew. I was seasick for two days. Even with youth and crew being sick we still did night shifts. When you threw up over the side of the ship you see so many dolphins crazily catching whatever goes over the side.



Day 5 we arrived in Melbourne, we had a good final day on the boat. During the whole trip we did navigation and look out shifts so we didn't crash into any other boats. We climbed the Mast and had great views of Melbourne.

The great view of Melbourne was very impressive and at night we went for an evening swim. Half of the students got off as they were from Melbourne.

We went to a Melbourne football game, Freemantle vs Melbourne and had a look around the City.

I met more Rotary exchange students some arrived from Queens-

land. I got the German Flag to join with others walking around with Rotary and other country flags for the opening Ceremony of Rotary World Convention when it was opened May 28.



I stayed till the end of the convention, meeting up with M-L, Steve, Julie, Duncan and Tao.

I Wish I Had Asked, is a program of the Rotary Club of Shepparton South. This intergenerational initiative was co-founded by the club by Eva Gruen and Danny Finley, who are social entrepreneurs from La Trobe University Accelerator Program 2018.

Eva and Danny wanted to create a program that would capture rhe stories of our older generations as well as tackle the growing problem of loneliness of our older generations as well as tackle the growing problem of loneliness and depression in our communities. They chose Shepparton to launch their pilot program and teamed up with the Rotary Club of Shepparton South which could connect them to local schools, aged care facilities and the RSL.

The Club applied for a grant from the Victorian Government's "Pick my Project" scheme and received over \$62,000.

After seeing the statistics on loneliness in Australia, the Shepparton community strongly supported the project.

I wish I Had Asked discovered that 40% of aged care residents do not get a regular visitor so they launched 16 different activities to connect high school apprentices with the silver warriors in aged care. Many of the conversations were recorded to create oral histories.

Activities ranged from cooking classes to internet café sessions, karaoke, and conversations with RSL veterans.

Although the program was initially designed to alleviate loneliness in seniors, it became apparent that many of the students involved were also experiencing loneliness. According to a survey done prior to the program 64% of the students were also experiencing loneliness and reported feeling they lacked someone to talk to either some of the time or often. So the program fostered positive outcomes benefitting not only the seniors, but also the Shepparton Community's young people.



It is clear the Shepparton community has experienced lasting benefits through this program. However, for the organisers, the Shepparton program is just the beginning.

The Club has registered a business name, Gen connection, which will enable the sustainable program to be used throughout Australia.

Lock away your possession's because there are people wandering around at night in Gawler.


Richard Tucker:



Don't talk just act,

Don't say just show,

Keyless theft (otherwise known as relay theft) is relatively simple; all it requires is two small boxes of electronics, which thieves can use to open your car in as little as 60 seconds. Crooks will typically work in pairs to commit relay theft, with one holding a relay amplifier, and the other a relay transmitter.



- 1. Thief one waits near the car with the transmitter.
- 2. The locking system sends out a signal which the key fob responds to.
- Thief one's transmitter forwards the signal onto Theif two's amplifier near the house.
- 4. His amplifier sends this information to the key fob which in turn sends the corect response back to theif one and opens the car.

Fortunately, there are a few steps you can take to reduce the likelihood that your key fob's transmission will be intercepted and that a thief will gain entry to your vehicle. Here are a few that we suggest:

- Keep your key fob in a container that blocks the signal it emits to eliminate the possibility that it will be intercepted. Faraday bags are designed specifically to protect your key fobs and credit cards and do their job well and they are not expensive. Alternatively, you could keep your keys in a safe or another metal container, however, depending on the container, this may or may not be 100% effective.
- If you don't have a safe place to store your key fob to prevent the signal from being
 intercepted, keep it as far from your vehicle as possible. Remember, the relay devices used by hackers to intercept and re-send unlock signals are effective from up to
 90 metres away. If, for example, you're at work and carry your keys in your pocket
 without having them in a Faraday bag, park your vehicle at the far end of the parking
 area.
