

# **Rotary Information—Matthew**

Rotary has in excess of 46000 clubs with in excess of 1.4 million members. It has 19 Directors and over 800 employees lead by CEO John Hewko from a Ukraine Rotary Club (who lives in America).

John Hewko leads by example:

From 2004 to 2009, he was vice president for operations & compact development for the Millennium Challenge Corporation (MCC), a U.S. government agency that delivered foreign assistance to the world's poorest countries.

At MCC, he was the principal United States negotiator for foreign assistance agreements to 26 countries in Africa, Asia, South America, the Middle East, and the former Soviet Union. John Hewko completed the negotiation of assistance agreements totaling \$6.3 billion to 18 countries for infrastructure, agriculture, water & sanitation, health, and education projects. While working in the Ukraine in 1990's he assisted the working group that prepared initial draft of the Ukraine post Soviet Constitution.

# **Guest Speaker**

Doreen Von Linde — Barossa Bush Gardens National Resource Coordinator.

The Barossa Bushgardens began in 2001 because there was very little native vegetation in Barossa. The original seven-hectare site was a grazing paddock in poor condition, with only 1 400-year-old 35m tall River Red Gum.

Five passionate volunteers began planting around the Old Gum Tree to collect seed for sewing in revegetation projects and for land holders to grow on their own farms.

This has developed into a community hub over the last twenty years. There are now people walking dogs and others bike riding along paths meandering through native bushland (open 7 days a week during daylight hours). There is also the labyrinth (with its reflective and stress relieving path), the Dementia Friendly Garden & Food for the Soul Community Garden, a fire (showcasing wise garden native plants that are fire resistant) as well as weekly dementia and disabilityfriendly workshops that are timetabled to facilitate specific needs.

The volunteer led Barossa Bush Garden community nursery continues to provide plants and seed for home gardens, shelterbelts, bush and native grassland restoration. It is open Tuesday and Thursday 9am—4:30 and Wednesday 9am—12:30.

Volunteers are seen as essential for the Barossa Bush Gardens. There are currently 49 members ranging in age from mid 20's to 80's.

Attracting and keeping volunteers starts with the management. We accept anyone. We just ask them to come to have fun. They can choose the area in which they want to work and we look for opportunities for them to come together and celebrate special times such as Birthdays. Sometimes we have random BBQs and also give out vouchers from the Coop.

We encourage volunteers to share ideas around a need or project. We involve them as much as we can in decision making. Volunteers are encouraged to give ideas for new gardens. This results in shared ownership as people work together to achieve goals which they relate to. They then know what they're doing so there is no need for me to stand there directing them. As an example—the Community labyrinth project had someone experienced with irrigation paired with someone who doesn't have skills. They helped each other to achieve the goal and shared skills.

We ensure time for socializing, eg morning tea. We also provide training such as a First Aid Course & snake awareness. We also try to remove paperwork where it can be a barrier for someone with a disability. Sometimes it means careers do the paperwork for people with disabilities making it simpler and easier for the volunteer who has a disability.

The disability advisory group involving people with various disabilities and who had lived experience with disabilities developed access plans for our sensory garden. We started a community garden with 5 disability workers, but everything shut down with COVID, particularly for those with a disability. However the need was acknowledged and the community garden has grown into a project where everyone can access it at anytime irrespective of disabilities. This in contrast to some other community gardens, such as Tanunda, which has limited access.

We entice people by giving lots of options that meets their skills set or time availability— eg fundraising at BBQ & events at the Gardens. Volunteers feel valued where they share responsibility for specific areas. They take on roles involving maintenance of the garden and infrastructure, propagation in the nursery, & support school educational projects etc. Tuesday and Thursday are the volunteering days.

We get some volunteers from centrelink. After 55 years of age they can volunteer for community work rather than searching for jobs, This means 15hrs volunteering per week and they don't have to apply for jobs every week. We are getting a lot of things done by these people,
