This could include the Burma Thai border where the influx of migrants, displaced from Myanmar have resulted in massive problems & great suffering. There is a particular need to develop a training centre for young people with livelihood skills who currently have no hope in their lives. An international project could also focus on empowering women and those living with a disability. It could even be OnTrend like Gaming!

Building futures from the ground up

Good Reads, May 2023 (660)

Founded by Gemma Sisia from Guyra, NSW, with strong support from her local Rotary clubs St Jude's first opened its gates in 2002, with three students and one volunteer teacher. Today, that school is changing the lives of thousands of dis-

advantaged youths and the communities they call home. 76% of students come from extreme poverty. 100 per cent of its students receive full scholarships.

From the first building ever built – led by the Rotary Club of Armidale Central, NSW – to water tanks, buses, furniture, power, playgrounds, and hot water, Rotary plays an integral role in the school's continued success. The school now employs more than 350 staff – 98 per cent of whom are Tanzanian – provides safe and supportive boarding for all of its secondary school students, and serves up 29,000 hot and nutritious meals each week.

Enock was a young student whose grandfather was a fortune teller and a traditional healer. Enock's father never got access to education as he had to help my grandfather and care for the cows. Enock's father wanted Enok to have the education he didn't, but he didn't have the means.

Enock successfully applied for a scholarship and eventually went onto university. While at university, Enock co-founded an initiative that brings together liked minded people from all over the world to share opportunities and support the school. As an outcome more than 300 Rotary clubs from all over the world have contributed to make St Jude's the success story it is today. Like minded Rotary Communities can achieve so much when focused as one.



<u>Guest Speaker – Greg Teague – Trade</u> School Insights



Greg used to pay 20c fines when a member of Apex many years ago. Greg requested appropriate an fine for Grant who organised him as the guest speaker because while organizing matters Grant was simultaneously being "attacked" by his unruly kitten.

Greg grew up in Orroroo but his father was a sheep grazier. However Greg didn't want to look at sheep mouths and sheep bums for the rest of his life, so as a 16 year old he applied for an apprenticeship at Weapons Research (now DSTO). He applied to be an Electrical fitter, but was accepted as an apprentice in Radio.

In Jan. 1976 Greg started his first day as an apprentice & had to sign the Official Secrets act on the first day. Physicals were done; issued with safety glasses (which Greg showed at the meeting); taught how to clock on and off; & issued with a locker, clothing, and safety boots. He started training lectures the next week. Apprentices were expected to learn a bit around all trades including technical drawing, which Greg disliked intensely. He learnt to solder, how to wire things etc.

Greg shared some of the sheet metal and mechanical skills learnt in the first year. Greg showed some of the things he made – a set of clamps, a pair of set squares, G clamps, and a one inch cube. The set squares started out as a piece of sheet metal and was a particularly difficult task. It required patience to complete these. Greg's number was A19 and everything that he made had this on them. All items were made from drawings. The one inch cube was feared be all apprentices – this was an

extraordinarily difficult task – getting all the angles correct and the dimensions correct. Everything that was made was assessed by an inspector out of 10. There was never a 10/10. In drilling and tapping threads there was a special gauge used to check the work.

The idea of fitting is to be able to hacksaw straight & file flat. Draw filing was forbidden.

Turning involved using a lathe to make a deburrer.

Sheet metal work – making shapes, joins, curves with sheet metal. Greg showed two oil (or wine) jugs that he made. A bucket with a lid (ideal for billy tea), a series of boxes and a metal box with a hinged curved lid.

Weekly pay packet was \$236, paid in cash every Thursday. It had to be counted in the presence of a paymaster.

Apprentices were issued with a toolbox. Dire threats if anything were lost!

When Greg completed his 4th year, he was awarded a prize for being top apprentice in 3rd and 4th year. The prize was an analogue voltmeter which Greg still keeps in its original display cabinet.

Questions:

Steve Mc – were any of the items used? Greg said that most things were for learning, although the deburring tool was used often.

Susan – What does a Radio Apprentice do? Greg replied that radio was the old-fashioned term for electronics & included Radio receivers, transmitters, wiring, soldering etc. In 1980 printed circuit boards came in and from then the area moved very fast. Greg did instrumentation work initially and towards the end, data capture & analysis.

Greg Morris asked if Greg spent any time at Woomera. Greg said he was involved in field trials at Woomera. Greg Morris mentioned that he had met Greg Teague there.

Dick thanked Greg for his presentation and mentioned he had many dental patients from WRE over the years and on one occasion Dick had to sign the official secrets act prior putting a person under a GA.


